Karen N led the February District Meeting with a Service Manual Workshop.

The workshop began with Al-Anon member Jody. D sharing her experience, strength and hope, with the following,

I came into Al-Anon because of the alcoholic in my life. Over the years I have discovered that I have plenty reasons to be in Al-Anon before I married an alcoholic.

In addition I am a take charge person so I quickly began taking on service positions in my Al-Anon group.

As I reflect today it was probably to avoid looking at myself – I just needed to be busy.

I was invited to attend a District meeting and to consider being the GR

or my home group. Well I did attend my first meeting and my answer to be a GR was a big loud and firm No. But I said I was willing to attend the meetings.

Eventually I thought I would bring some sanity to the District so I said I would be a GR. I now see a pattern that just like a good member of Al-Anon I saw myself as having the ability to straighten things out.

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DOES THIS SOUND FAMILIAR?

In preparing this sharing I began to think about all that being a GR has given me and my recovery. Let me share with you.....

ALL I EVER NEEDED TO KNOW I LEARNED AS A GROUP REPRESENTATIVE IN AL-ANON

Service in Al-Anon can enrich my Serenity

SERENITY, FOR ME, DOES NOT COME IN A VACUUM BUT RATHER THROUGH MY RELATIONSHIPS. BEING A GR EXPANDED MY OPPORTUNITIES TO BUILD RELATIONSHIPS.

Service in Al-Anon can help me have friends

IN OUR MEETING CLOSING WE SAY TAKE WITH WHOM I IMMEDIATELY IDENTIFY. WE CAN EASILY BUILD FRIENDSHIPS.

Service in Al-Anon can help me solve disagreements.

IN THE WORK OF AL-ANON I USUALLY HAVE STRONG OPINIONS ABOUT WHAT IS RIGHT AND WHAT IS WRONG. I HAVE COME TO THE REALIZATION THAT MOST MEMBERS HAVE THIS SAME ATTITUDE. OFTEN THIS CAN LEAD TO DISAGREEMENTS, BUT IN AL-ANON I LEARN HOW TO HONESTLY WORK WITH THOSE WITH WHOM I DISAGREE. THIS IS THE MAGIC OF A GROUP CONSCIENCE.

Service in Al-Anon can help me work well with others.

I HAVE LEARNED TO FOCUS ON THE POSITIVE WHEN WORKING WITH OTHERS. TO ACCEPT MY-SELF AND OTHERS AS WE ARE. I CAN EVEN LAUGH AT MY OWN REACTIONS.

Service in Al-Anon can help me learn how to listen to others.

AS IN MY MEETINGS WHEN I AM DOING MY JOB AS A GR I MUST LISTEN TO OTHERS. THIS MEANS NOT ONLY LISTEN TO BUT RESPECT OTHERS IDEAS AND TURN TO THE WISDOM OF THE GROUP AND OUR LITERATURE.

Service in Al-Anon can help give me my voice.

- I HAVE LEARNED A RESPECTFUL WAY OF EXPRESSING MY OPINIONS. I DO NOT TRY TO MAKE YOU FEEL AS THOUGH YOU KNOW NOTHING.
- MANY OF US IN AL-ANON WILL NOT SPEAK UP WHEN WE FEEL UNCOMFORTABLE ABOUT WHAT IS HAPPENING BUT I HAVE LEARNED THAT I HAVE THE RIGHT TO CHANGE MY MIND AND SPEAKUP.

Service in Al-Anon helps to keep me coming back.

- PROBABLY THE BIGGIST GIFT I GET FROM BEING A GR AND DOING SERVICE IS THAT IT KEEPS ME COMING BACK. I AM A PERSON WHO, WHEN I MAKE A COMMITMENT, I FEEL BOUND BY THAT COMMITMENT AND FEEL VERY DISAPPOINTED WITH MYSELF IF I DIDN'T KEEP THAT COMMITMENT.
- SO I CREDIT MY YEARS OF SERVICE IN THE GROUP AND DISTRICT LEVEL WITH MY CONTINUED SERENITY IN MY RECOVERY IN AL-ANON.
- Please do not mistake my words to mean that I always do what I have learned but I do know that I can live by the slogan "progress not perfection".
 - One last thing I would like to share is a thought from Paul W., a long time member, is that he didn't know how Al-Anon works but that is just does. In service Jody D.
